COURT WEEK AND SALESDAY.—The past has been a busy week for Orangeburg. Crowds of farmers, with wagons, horses, vehicles of every description, except the velocipede, flocked to the Town on Monday last, and the "bustle of business" has scarcely diminished during the week.

The Court of General Sessions and Common Pleas met on Monday at three o'clock P. M.


