The following are the sentences passed on prisoners at this term of the Court by his Honor Judge Carpenter:

The State vs. Sam Jones—Grand Larceny—Sentence to two years in the Penitentiary.

State vs. Anthony Johnson, Adam Welsh, Wade Gadsden, George Evans—Grand Larceny—Sentence to three years in the Penitentiary.

State vs. Daniel Green—Petit Larceny—Fined fifty dollars.

State vs. Laval Paulding, Smart Bowman, Antrum McGrew, Abram Gillmore—Hog Stealing—Sentence Laval Paulding to pay a fine of one hundred dollars or six months in County Jail.

State vs. Charles F. Gehrels—Assault with intent to Kill—Fined one hundred dollars and cost.

State vs. Wade Gadsden—Stealing one year of Corn—Sentence to five days in County Jail.

State vs. Charles F. Gehrels—Assault and Battery with intent to Kill—Second case—Sentence five hundred dollars fine.

State vs. William Sistrunk—Assault and Battery—Fined ten dollars.

State vs. Daniel Green—Second case—Larceny—Fined ten dollars or ten days in County Jail.

State vs. Laval Paulding, Smart Bowman, Antrum McGrew, Abram Gillmore—Larceny—Fined each ten dollars or twenty days in County Jail.

It will be seen, by reference to the announcement in another column, that Mr. Wm. N. Mount has been placed before the voters of Orangeburg County as a candidate for School Commissioner. The chicane, fraud, and undoubted established dishonesty of a certain party to manipulate matters to suit their own ends and interest, has caused the friends of Mr. Mount to take this course. 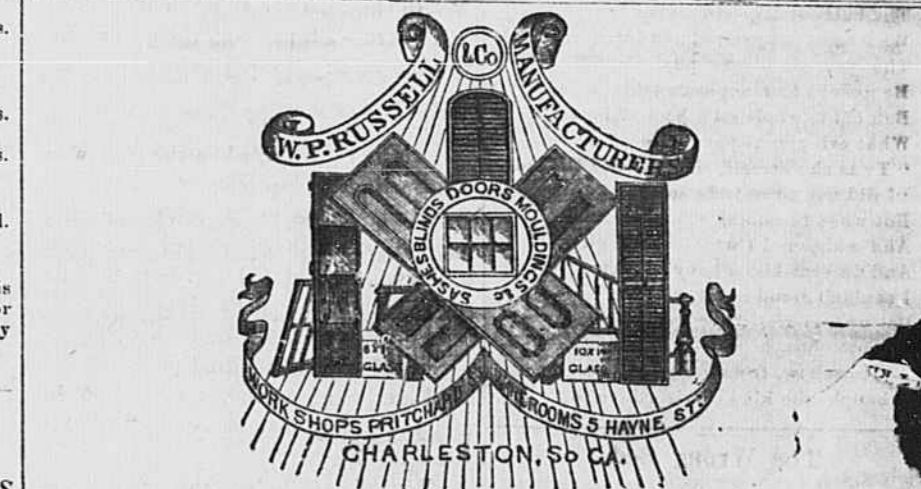
