**George Peabody.**

The telegram from London, informs us that the Bishop of London preached the funeral of George Peabody at Westminster Abbey, on the 18th inst.

The Bishop said in his discourse:—"No untold commoner has ever gathered such a concourse of sincere mourners around his grave. He labored to relieve the wants of the poor and by them he was beloved, as by all those who sympathize with poverty and honor benevolence. It was his benevolence. It was his business to gather and his joy to give. Two nations will ever reverence his name, which forms another bond of union between England and America."
