We have been requested to state that in calling Dr. Thos. A. Elliott "the first freeman of Orangeburg," we have somewhat ignored the claims of some of our oldest citizens to share this honor with the honored Chief.

Just after the memorable fire in 1854, the following gentlemen started the organization of a Fire Department, and persevered until their idea was a success, viz: Dr. Thos. A. Elliott, Messrs. Harpin Riggs, D. Louis and Captains F. H. W. Briggman and Jos. P. Harley. These then, are Orangeburg's first Firemen.

Honor to whom honor is due!

FIRES.—On Sunday morning last about the time that people who had been to church, were coming out, the cry of fire, was heard in the streets. The day was boisterous and windy, so that it was difficult to extend the alarm. It was soon discovered that it was the kitchen of Mr. Jones that was on fire. It appears that a spark ascending into the loft set fire to some old rubbish there. It was soon extinguished by Mr. Jones himself, not however, before the Young America, followed by the Hook and Ladder and the Comet were on the ground, to assist in putting it out.

We regret to learn that on the same night, the barn and stables of Mr. D. D. Antley, about twelve miles from Orangeburg, were consumed. It was evidently the work of an incendiary, as disguised tracks were discovered at the spot.

Nearly all Mr. Antley's provisions were destroyed, and his horses, steers and a fine milch cow were also badly burned. Among the stock was a very fine mare, which will lose one of her eyes in consequence of her injuries.

THE CENSUS.—The census of the State, made in 1869, is published. In 1860 the total population of the State of all colors and classes was 703,708. In 1869 it was 661,099 showing a decrease during the last nine years of 42,609 inhabitants.

The total population of Orangeburg County in 1860 was, 24,896 in 1869 it was 26,842, an increase of 1,946 colored inhabitants and of 637 whites.

Revels the colored U. S. Senator from Mississippi has taken his seat in the Senate. The Vice-President had to restrain expressions of delight in the galleries. After the adjournment the crowd rushed enthusiastically around him to congratulate and admire him.

TERRIBLE FIRE IN MARION.—On Monday night last, Feb. 28th, at half past 11 o'clock, the flames broke out in a store occupied by H. Clark, and in spite of all efforts to check the spread of the conflagration, in the course of a few hours, no less than thirteen houses in the business centre of the village, were consumed.

The loss is estimated at from \$25,000 to \$40,000. One man, Mr. Isoman, was burned to death.

A telegraph operator, who had sent a message to a Newark family to meet an expected visitor at the depot with the "horse," blunderingly substituted the word "hearse," and on the arrival of the train the visitor found that desired vehicle awaiting to transport him to his destination.

SPEECH OF A FACTORY GIRL.—At the Women's Convention, Miss Collins was introduced as a Lowell factory girl, of Boston, and made a speech which did not fall very musical upon the ears of some of the New England present. She made a comparison of the black slaves of the South with the white factory slaves of the North, and declared that the black Southern slaves of former days knew nothing of cruelty and tyranny; it was necessary to have been a factory girl in New England to appreciate the highest order of slaves. Miss Collins expressed the opinion that while Congress was conferring equal rights in some sections it should turn its attention to the factory operatives, and pass some laws for their advantage and benefit. The speech created quite a sensation in Washington.—*Baltimore Sun.*
