Directly after Governor Scott sent his last annual message to the General Assembly, an editorial appeared in this paper commending him for the stand he had taken, and for the promises made to the whole people of our State in that document. At that time, however, a different spirit pervaded the Press of the State, and our views and commendations of Governor Scott, were concurred in only by a few papers. We then said that the Executive of our State intended to carry out in good faith the pledges he had made. But that prejudiced spirit, which has so long been the curse of our land, urged our people to doubt the carrying out of any promises that emanated from a Republican. They would not believe what the plain drifts of events, however powerful in their course. pointed out. But as we said then, and repeat again to-day, the future will work out and render praise unto him to whom praise is due. Governor Scott to-day receives the commendations of the entire press of our State. Had any one six months ago attempted to foreshadow this circumstance in the history of our country, as one that would transpire, he would have been denounced. Now. however, it is a common thing to hear men speak in praise of him whom it were a crime in the eyes of a certain socieiy not long ago to commend. Governor Scott's special message, and his firm opposition to Martial Law, in time of peace. is worthy of the plandits of all law-abiding and peace loving citizens. And that opposition is firm. Also, his strong stand against corruption and a further increase of taxation, is commendatory and renders him an object of admiration for every citizen, except perhaps now and then an extremist to whom no plan that is honest and conservative in its tone is satisfactory. But let Governor Scott not relax his energies, and his determination to lighten the burden of taxation under which our people now labor. He will receive the thanks and support of all who are decent and respectable. That alone should guard him on to grander strides in his promises of retrenchment and reform.

In connection with the above it may not be out of place to say that had Governor Scott yielded to the wishes of the few hot heads tho desired him to declare Martial Law in the up-country, before to-day some of the bloodiest scenes would have been enacted upon the soil of South Carolina, that ever convulsed a people in time of peace. But wiser heads and wiser impulses influenced the Governor, and the consequence is that peace and order are being restored in the up-country faster than we hoped for. Just the other day, intelligence reached Columbia in relation to new Klu Klux resolutions and outrages, but they all appeared to have been committed by men not of this State The Governor will do all he can to have the offenders arrested, and in his efforts to enforce the civil law, will receive the assistance of all honest men, white and

That was a wise decision of Governor Scott against sending the Militia to the up-country. We commend him for it.
