C., will be open for the Collection of State, County and School Times for the year 1871, on the Twentieth (20th) day of November A. D. 1871, and will continu Collection of the said Taxes, until the Fifteenth (15th) day of January A. D. 1872 after which date a PENALTY OF TWENTY (20) PER CENT WILL BE ADDED TO THE TAX.

The total rate per centum for State purposes is Seven (7) Mills on a dollar, and the per centum for General County Purposes is three (3) Mills on a dollar upon all the Real and Personal Property of each Tax Payer.
