SUDDEN DEATHS.—Two very sudden deaths have occurred in this County within the past week. Mr. Newton Redmond, who lives near Blackville, was sick but two days, and Dr. A. C. Harley, of Burnwell, died suddenly of inflammation of the throat, and but a few hours previous to his death, seemed in excellent health. These gentlemen were highly esteemed and useful citizens and members of the Masonic fraternity.

Dr. Harley was a native of this place and a brother of our fellow townsman J. P. Harley Esq. The family have our earnest sympathy in their affliction.

LIVELY TIMES AT LEWISVILLE.—Lewisville is a lively place. Since its incorporation it is putting on airs and seems determined to make a noise in the world. Well, it has a right to, for after our own Orangeburg it is the most flourishing place on the Railroad between Charleston and Columbia.

Last Wednesday, Trial Justice Meyers held a Court there, which was very largely attended. The case submitted to the consideration of his Honor and a jury was one against Mr. Rufus Kleckly for violating the License law by carrying on the business of a merchandise broker without having paid the required fee. Nine witnesses were examined for the prosecution, which was represented by Mr. George W. Sturgeon. Upon the close of the evidence for the State, Mr. Knowlton, counsel for de-

fendant, moved that the case be dismissed on the ground that no violation of the law had been proven. His Honor granted the motion and the defendant was discharged.

After the adjournment of Court an impromptu meeting was held at the depot platform where the following speakers were called upon and addressed the large and attentive audience; J. Felder Meyers, Fuller Prickett, Augustus B. Knowlton, James L. Jamison, George W. Sturgeon, Rev. Mr. Torrance, Adam C. Williams, James J. Mitchell, and George E. Whaley.

Mr. Whaley would probably desire us to say that his remarks were entirely non-partisan; and so we do say. The rest of the speeches however were earnestly Republican in their character.

A REPUBLICAN MASS MEETING was held at the Club House last Saturday, and attended by representatives from almost every part of the County. Mr. James J. Mitchell was appointed Chairman and Mr. F. R. McKinlay, Secretary. Addresses were made by Messrs. Joseph A. Keller, James L. Jamison, Frank R. McKinlay, J. Felder Meyers, John H. Phillips, James Weeks, H. Riggs, Ralph Crawford, Russell W. Wilson, Adam C. Williams, Christian Caldwell and Charles Greene.

Resolutions were adopted to the effect that the party should support only those who had been faithful to it in the dark days of the past. We would give them in full had we been furnished with a copy.

Some of the speakers objected to the early opening of the campaign, but the general feeling seemed to be the other way.

Orangeburg is sound for Grant beyond the shadow of a doubt.

At a mass meeting of Republican citizens held at Club House, St. Matthews, on Saturday May 25th 1872, the following preamble, and resolutions offered by Mr. Charles H. Green were unanimously adopted.

Whereas the Republicans of Orangeburg County are about to enter upon another campaign, in the heat of which it is expected that much bickering for political preference will occur, and Whereas, it is absolutely essential that the Republican party should be governed by its wisest counsellors, in order to defeat its opponents, as well as to secure harmony, and render more available the strength of its own forces.

Therefore Be it Resolved, That the Republicans of Orangeburg County, consisting chiefly of poor working men, will do all in their power for the elevation of only such men as those who cling to the party in its dark and gloomy days. Resolved, That we recognize the claims of those who enlighten us when there seemed no hope for our race. Resolved, That this preamble and Resolutions be published in the ORANGEBURG NEWS.

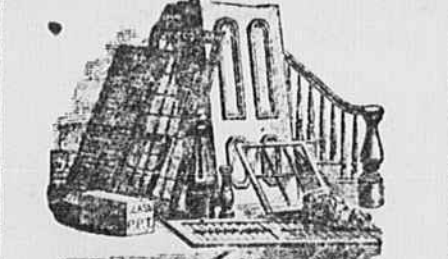
