The following is a correct statement of Cotton raised by Stevens & Cureton, on 1 1/2 acres of stubble land, which was manured with 400 pounds of Carolina Fertilizer. It was thoroughly plowed up 12 inches deep, and laid off in rows 3 feet wide, and the Fertilizer applied in the drill, then bedded on it on the 15th of May, and planted the same day, but owing to the wet and dry weather, did not come up to a stand until about the 1st of June. First working it was run around with a half shovel and partially trimmed out with a hoe. Second working it was run around with a 3 inch grub, 12 inches long, and the middles thrown out with a sweep 18 inches wide. One furrow to a row and thinned to a stand with a hoe about 12 inches between the stalks, and afterwards it was ploughed every two weeks with a sweep 18 inches wide, and hoeed each time, until it was worked five times. The following is a correct statement of the Cotton picked: 1st Picking.....254 2d Picking.....410 3d Picking.....413 Estimated amount of 12 unopened matured bolls.....816 Total.....1873 Respectfully submitted, STEVENS & CURETON.
