TRIUMPHANT!

WILMINGTON, N. C., August 21st, 1871.

The following is a correct statement of Cotton raised by Stevens & Curton, on 14 acres of stubble land, which was manured with 150 pounds of Carolina Fertilizer. The following is the mode of cultivation: It was thoroughly broken up 12 inches deep, and laid off in rows 2 1/2 feet wide, and the Fertilizer applied in the drill, then bedded on the top of the rows, and the ground covered with a sweep 18 inches wide, and hoes between the rows. One furrow to a row, and the rows were worked with a sweep 12 inches between the rows, and afterwards with a sweep 18 inches wide, and hoes between the rows, until it was worked five times.
