Court.—The Court of General Sessions met for October Term on Monday last. The Court has been engaged during the week in the trial of criminal cases of small importance. No matter of general importance or interest has been brought forward.

The Grand Jury was discharged on Tuesday evening after presenting their report, which we publish in another column. The Petit Juries were discharged on Friday morning. The verdicts were generally "guilty."

The sentences were pronounced by his Honor Judge Graham on Friday afternoon. We will publish the full proceedings next week.

State vs Chas S Bull official misconduct, fined \$173.70

State vs Arimus Glover assault with intent to kill—three months in jail.

State vs John Davis house breaking, and grand larceny—two years in penitentiary.

State vs Nella Thompson rape—ten years in penitentiary.

State vs Mary Ponder and Lucy Williams, house breaking and grand larceny—two years in penitentiary.

State vs Sandy Sharp and John Grimes, burglary and larceny—two years in penitentiary.

State vs George Colter, receiving stolen goods—one month in jail.

State vs Charles Colter, grand larceny—two years in penitentiary.

State vs Thos Jackson, burglary and larceny—two years in penitentiary.

State vs Jessie Ollister, malicious trespass—pay a fine of \$25 and cost by first January next.

State vs Peter King, burglary and larceny—two years in penitentiary.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

IN pursuance of an act of the General Assembly approved March 1, 1870, entitled "An act, providing for the general election and the manner of conducting the same, amended by an act approved March 12, 1872, an election will be held in the several counties of this State on the THIRD WEDNESDAY, being the 16th day of October, for the following State, Legislative, County and Congressional officers, to serve for the next two and four years, as provided by the State constitution and acts of Congress of the United States, to wit: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Comptroller General, Superintendent of Education, Adjutant and Inspector General, members of the General Assembly, Solicitors in the several judicial circuits, and for the various county offices, together with one Member of Congress to represent the State at large, and Representatives in the respective Congressional Districts.

At the said election the following amendments to the State Constitution will be submitted to the voters for ratification or rejection, to wit:

1st. Amendment relating to change of time of holding general elections. Strike out all of that portion of Section XI of Article 2, following the words "eighteen hundred and seventy" occurring in the fourth and fifth lines, and insert the following: "And forever thereafter, on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, in every second year, in such manner and at such places as the Legislature may provide." The manner of voting on this amendment shall be as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitutional Amendment—Yes." Those opposed to said amendment shall cast a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitutional Amendment—No."

2d. Amendment relating to the further increase of the public debt of the State, as follows: Article XVI. "To the effect that the public debt of South Carolina may not hereafter be increased without the due consideration, and free consent of the people of the State, the General Assembly is hereby forbidden to create any further debt or obligation, either by the loan of the credit of the State, by guarantee, endorsement or otherwise, except for the ordinary and current business of the State, without first submitting the question as to the creation of any such new debt, guarantee, endorsement or loan of the credit, to the people of this State, at a general election; and unless two-thirds of the qualified voters of his State, voting on the question shall be in favor of a further debt, guarantee, endorsement or loan of this credit, none shall be created or made."

The manner of voting on this amendment shall be as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitutional Amendment, Article XVI—Yes." Those opposed to the amendment shall cast a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitutional Amendment, Article XVI—No."

All bar-rooms and drinking saloons shall be closed on the day of election, and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drinks on the day of election, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for a period not less than one month, nor more than six months.

The Commissioners and Managers of Election, and each of them are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State, touching their duty in such cases, to cause such elections to be held in their respective counties on the day aforesaid, and to take all necessary steps for the holding of such elections, and for the ascertaining the persons who shall have been duly elected thereat, according to the rules, principles and provisions prescribed by the Act and Amendment thereto, aforesaid. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, the 6th day of September, A. D. 1872, and in the Ninety-seventh year of the Independence of the United States of America.
