STATE OF SOUTA CAROLINA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

N pursuance of an act of the General Aasembly approved March 1, 1370, entitled "An act, providing for the general election and the manner of conducting the same. amended by an act approved Mich 12, 1872, an election will be held in the several coenties of this State on the THIRD WEDNESDAY, being the 16th day of October, for the following State, Legislative, County and Congressional officers, to serve for the next two and four years as praided for the next two and four years, as provided by the State constitution and acts of Con-gress of the United States, to wit: Grver-nor, Licutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Comptroller General, Superintendent of Education, Adjutant and Inspector General, members of the Goneral Assembly, Solicitors in the several judicial circuits, and for the various county effects, together with one Member of Congress to represent the State at large and Representation in the at large, and Representative in the respec-

tiqe Congecssional District.

At the said election the following amendments to the State Constitution will be submitted to the voters for ratification or rejection, to wit:

lst. Amendment relating to change of time of holding general elections. Strike out all of that portion of Section XI of Article 2, following the words "eighteen hundred and seventy" occurring in the fourth and fifth lines, and insert the following: "And forever thereafter, on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, in every second year, in such manner and at such places as the Legislature may provide. The manner of voting on this amendment shall be as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, Constitutional Amendment—Yes." Those opposed to said amendment—Yes." Those opposed to said amendment shall cast a ballot with the following words written or printed thereon, "Constitution Amendment—No."

2d. Amendment relating to the further increase of the public debt of the State, as called a Villa Technology.

follows: Article XVI. "To the end that the public debt of South Carolina may not hereafter be increased without the due con sideration, and free content of the people of the State, the General Assembly is hereby forbidden to create any further debt or obligation, either by the loan of the credit of the State, by guarantee, endorsement or otherwise, except for the ordinary and current business of the State, without first submitting the question as to the creation of any such new nebt, guarantee, endorsement or loan of the credit to the people of this State, at a general election; and unless twothirds of the qualified qeters of this State voting on the question shall be in faqor of a further debt, guarantes, enforcement or loan of this credi , none shall be created or

The manner of voting on this amendment shall be as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall de-

posit a bailet with the following words written or printed thereon, "Consultational Amendment. Article XVI. - Yes." Taose opposed to the amendment shall

cast a ba'lot, with the following words written or printed thereon—"Constitutional Amendment Article XVI-No."

Ali bar-rooms and dainking saloons shall be closed on the day of election, and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drinks on the day of election, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction there-of, shall be fined in a sum not less than one bundred dollars, or be imprisoned for a period not less than one month, nor more

The Commissioners and Managers of Election, and each of them, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the Constitutin and laws of the State touching their duty in such ease, to cause such elections to be held in their respective counties on the day aforesaid, and to take all necessary steps for the holding of such elections, and for the ascertaining the per sons who shall have seen duly elected there at, according to the rules, principles and provisions prescribed by the Actual Amendment thereto, aforesaid. In witness whereof I have hereunte set my hand and caused the great scal of the State to be affixed.
