

The managers of Election at each Precinct will be furnished with a box which shall be publicly opened and inspected, to shall be publicly opened and inspected, to see that it is empty and secure, and then locked, just before the opening of the Polls, by two or more desinterested parties, and the keys returned to the managers, and shall not be opened during the Election. At the close of the Election the Managers and Clerk shall immediately proceed publicly to pen the ballot box and count the ballots therein, and continue such count with out adjournment or interruption until the same is completed, and make such statement of the result thereof, and sign the same as nature of the Election shall require, if in counting two or more like ballots should be found folded together compactly, only one shall be counted and the others destroyed but if they bear different names, the same shall be destroyed and not counted. If more ballots should be found on opening the box than there are names on the polllist, all the ballots shall be returned to the box, and thoroughly mixed together, and one of the Managers or the Clerk shall without seeing the ballots, draw therefrom and immediately destroy as many ballots as there are in excess of the number of names on

Within three days thereafter the Chair-man or one of the managers to be designa-ted in writing by the Board, shall deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll-list, the boxes centaining the ballots, and written statement of the result of the Election in his precinct. The Polls shall be opened at o'clock in the forenoon and closed at 6 o'clock in the afternoon, on the said day of Election, and shall be kept open during these hours without intermission or adjournment, and the Managers shall administer to person offering to vote, an oath that they are qualified to vote at this Election according to the Constitution of this State and that they have not voted during this
