The Work of the Session.

The General Assembly adjourned on the 20th of December for the holidays.

Much has been done, and much good. Only a cavelling spirit can see ought to complain of in the Legislative action up to this period of the Session.

When the Legislature reassembles it is hoped that immediate and vigorous work will characterize its proceedings.

Two important bills are before the Assembly which should receive the careful thought and investigation which they deserve.

One of these is the bill to make the office of the County Treasurer elective by the people.

The other and more important one is the bill to regulate the disbursement of the public moneys in the several Counties in this State.

This bill provides that the Auditor of each County, shall once in every three months audit all accounts and claims of County Commissioners and Treasurers, and keep a record of them in his office.

The clerk of the Court in each County is then to receive all claims against the County and decide whether they be paid or not.

The merits of this bill are patent. Such measures as this furnish checks and restraints to corruption, negligence and misconduct on the part of County officials, and remove much of the temptation that now exists to be careless or criminal.
