REMARKS OF COL. WM. H STEPHENS.

Colonel Wm. H. Stephens said conversationally that, as a member of the Centennial Board of Finance, it is not improper for me to speak a few words at this, your first meeting in West Ten nessee. By an act of Congress, approved on the third day of March, 1871. provision was made for the due celebra tion at Philadelphia of the one hundredth appiversory of the American Independence in the year 1876, with appropriate ceremonies, and by the dis play of our unclount resources and our progress in the useful arts, on a scale which should attract the attention of the civilized world. Under this act one commissioner and one alternate commissioner were appointed from each State and Territory to promote and control the exhibition. For Tennessee, the Commissioner is Thomas H. Coldwell, of Shelbyville, and the Alternate is William F. Prosser, Nashville, both of whom have brought to the discharge of their duties much ability and the most dollars, to be known as the of citizens of all the States and Terri-

But, genilemen, there are other motives for our participation in this great industrial exposition. Its influence in re-establishing cordial relations among those who have heretofore been alienated from each other cannot be too highly estimated. Since, to all human views it seems to be the will of Providence that we are to remain united in government, to obey the same laws, to speak one language, to live under the same roof and to worship at the same altars. it is obviously the part of true wisdom to dwell together in unity, and to pro mote a reisit of congord throughout the wide extent of our country. In the celebration of the "year of jubilee," and in the flow of good feeling to result from it, we can see a way of escape from those social and political troubles and complications which have utterly con founded the schemes of the party politi cians, and have perplexed even the wis dom of the statesmen. Compulsory legislation may enforce obedience of the law, but it cannot heal the wounded spirit, nor rekindle fires of patriotism.
