

**Making the Most of a Garden.**

Every garden is made to yield more than half what they are capable of doing under good culture and care, and it shall be the purpose of this paper to describe some of the methods in use among the market gardeners, by which the garden is made to yield two, and even three crops in a season. But little more labor or manure is needed for the two crops than one—in fact, the amount of manure required to produce the crop in perfection will generally carry through the second with little addition.

**The Early Crops are—** The Late Crops are—  
Peas..... May be followed by Potatoes, Squashes, Turnips, Pickles, Cabbages, Celery, Spinach, Beans, Sweet E'y Cabbage, Herbs, Sage, Marjoram, Onions from Seed, &c., &c., Turnips, Squashes, Celery

The early crops must be well manured and tilled, in order to be cleared off in season for the latter ones, and this must be done with promptness in order to prevent interference. The succession given above is what is in general use among gardeners, and admits some changes—thus celery may follow potatoes on strong, rich land, but not peas or beans, as the amount of manure and moist land suited to produce celery in perfection is not good for peas and beans. Where peas are wanted in succession, as they are in most gardens (though not in the market at profitable prices), the early ones may be followed by squashes, the latter by turnips or cabbage. Again, the amount of manure needed to produce good, early lettuce, beets and spinach would be worse than wasted on a late crop of turnips, which would be very large but coarse and wormy. Moreover, cabbage cannot be to follow cabbage or turnips, or the reverse, without an interval of at least two years, unless on some kinds of limestone land.

When peas and potatoes are to be followed by squashes, every fourth row of the early crop should be left blank in planting; in this blank row the squash seed should be sown the first week in June; they will not run before July 10th, giving time to clear away the early crop and plow the land between the squashes. The same plan is adopted when celery follows potatoes; the celery plants are set in June in a blank row between the potatoes, and banked up after the potatoes are cleared away. When peas or potatoes are followed by turnips, it is common to give the land a light plowing or harrowing, and rolling and brushing, sowing the turnip seed about the last of July.

When late cabbages are to follow peas or potatoes, the land should receive, if possible, a second manuring, after the early crop is cleared off, and made firm by plowing. The cabbage plants must be set by July 20th to head well.

The land for spinach, lettuce, beets, early cabbage, and onions, should be made very rich by abundant manuring, and these crops are generally made to precede celery, which needs also very rich land to do well. The spinach and lettuce will be all cleared before setting the celery plants, but blank rows should be left between the beets and onions, as they will not come off early enough to set the celery, though in ample season for banking it up. The celery rows should be eight feet apart, at least when the Boston Market celery is planted; the dwarf kinds can be planted closer, but are inferior. It is rather difficult to make melons do well as a second crop without hot beds in which to start the melons in pots so as to get them out about June 5th among the lettuce or spinach; or melon seed may be sown June 1st, in hills five feet apart, among the lettuce and spinach; like all vines, they need light land highly manured.

Cucumber pickles are made to follow peas, or are sown on a freshly turned greensward June 20th to July 10th. When among peas we usually plant between the peas at the last hoeing. Sweet corn may be cleared early enough to be followed by flat turnips, and may be sown late after a crop of spinach or peas. Sown as late as July 5th it does well.

Tomato plants are sometimes set between the rows of peas, but the practice is not recommended except when late tomatoes are wanted. Cauldlowers may be planted on rich land, July 1st to 10th, after early potatoes or lettuce. It is not uncommon to raise two crops of turnip beets on the same land, the first crop pulled by July 10th; the second will mature in October of sufficient size for good table beets. Horseradish may be grown also as a late crop after lettuce, spinach, or beets. A little skill and care will be needed to adopt the above suggestions, and make them succeed.
