A Grange is about to start in Horry county. The up counties are busily engaged in planting cotton.

Easter Sunday was observed with unusually eloquent sermons and magnificent ceremonies in all the churches in Charleston.

Mr. W. G. Trot, who, for a quarter of a century, kept a drug store in Charleston, died in Bremen, Germany on the 4th.

J. E. Birings and Bob Johnson escaped from Georgetown jail on Monday week.

The Laurens farmers are planting more corn and will plant less cotton than usual.

The Village of Lancaster supports two goats which it could easily do without.

The Rev. Dr. Wilson, of Columbia delivered the March lecture before the Cheraw Lyceum. Subject: "True success in Life."

The Mills House, at Charleston, South Carolina, which cost over \$200,000 in gold, was sold at auction for \$27,000.

Fisher and Swinny, two colored men, fought at Bennettsville on Saturday week. Swinny, with an axe, wounded Fisher in the shoulder.

The barn and stables of Mr. Hogan Moses, residing in the neighborhood of Cross Hill, Laurens County, were on tirely destroyed by fire on Wednesday night, 25th ultimo.

Capt. W. G. Mellwain, of Lancaster, found a hen's nest on his premises last week, with one hundred and forty eggs in it. This is no "snake story," but is vouched for as a fact.

Mr. J. J. Rugin, a prominent citizen of Clarendon County, died on Saturday week. Cause, a third paralytic stroke. Mr. R. B. Davis, of Georgetown, died on the 22d ultimo.

A fire occurred on Sunday night on Sullivan's Island, which resulted in the complete destruction of the fine and well furnished residence of Mr. Moses G. Smith. It was with great difficulty that the handsome residence of Dr. Patrick was saved from a similar fate.

A cotton factory is to be established at High Shoals, Anderson County, S. C. Fifty thousand dollars have been subscribed, and a much larger subscription is expected. A meeting of the stockholders will take place at High Shoals on the 25th inst.

Hilliard D. Boulevard, of Fairfield County, was arrested and carried on Thursday to Tennessee on a requisition from Gov. Brown, on the charge of horse stealing. Boulevard is a very bright man. He left Fairfield with Sherman, and was not heard of until his return about two weeks ago.

To all whom it may Concerns:

Pursuant to Title 3, chap. 13, Revised Statutes S. C. Section 58 requires:

Sec 58. If any person, company or corporation shall commence any business in any County of this State after the first day of September in any year, the capital or property employed in which shall not have been previously listed for taxation in said County, and shall not within thirty days thereafter make such report to the Auditor of said County as is required in the sixteenth Section of this Act, he or they shall forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred dollars, which shall be collected by civil action in the name of the County Commissioners, and paid into the County Treasury for the exclusive benefit of the County, and process in such case may issue out of the Court of Common Pleas of the County in which such business was commenced, directed to the proper officer, and be served in any County of this State.
