In the case of James and Elizabeth Browne against T. W. Glover, acting Treasurer of this county; A. B. Knowlton Esq., made application to Judge Graham, yesterday morning, for an order to show cause why the Treasurer should not receive, in payment of taxes, bills of the Bank of the State which had been tendered for that purpose. His Honor thereupon made a general order—postponing the sale of all lands advertised for sale for taxes in Orangeburg county, for which taxes bills of the Bank of the State have been offered in payment, until the further order of the court.

During the last week of Court many things have transpired of no little consequence. On Wednesday a gentleman took our Jury Commissioner's seat, when the following dialogues ensued:

Larkins—Mr. Black, this is my chair.

Treasurer.—The devil it is. Take a back seat, old man, and be quiet.

Here Mr. Larkins bristled up and said I want you to know, sir, that I'm to lie r in this Court, and if you don't make tre's instantly, I will have you sent to jail for contempt. Treasurer retired, and our popular Jury Commissioner took his seat.

Among the interesting cases at this term of the Court was the case of the state vs Russell Wilson for the murder of Jeffrey Hersey, near Lewisville on the 9th of January last. The case was set for Thursday last, and on that morning a vast crowd surrounded the court House, and filled every available space in the house. A large number of people were at the Jail to see the prisoner come out. About 200 persons followed him to the court House.

When the case was called Mr. Knowlton of counsel for defence, moved for a continuance, and stated that he proposed to ask for a change of venue. Mr. Solicitor Buttz and Malcolm L. Browning Esq., opposed the motion. The argument was lengthy and able on both sides. The Judge at last granted the motion and the case was marked continued.

The Solicitor and Mr. Browning represented the State and Mr. Knowlton and Messrs Izlar & Dibble the defence.

NOTICE. U. S. Internal Revenue SPECIAL TAXES, May 1, 1874, to April 30, 1875.

The Law of December 24, 1872, requires every person engaged in any business, avocation, or employment which renders him liable to Special Tax, to procure and Place conspicuously in his Establishment or place of business a Stamp denoting the payment of said Special Tax for the Special Tax year beginning May 1, 1874, before commencing or continuing business after April 30, 1874.

The taxes embraced within the provisions of the Law above quoted are the following, viz: Rectifiers, \$200.00. Dealers, retail liquor, 25.00. Dealers, wholesale liquor, 100.00. Dealers in malt liquors, wholesale, 50.00. Dealers in malt liquors, retail, 20.00. Dealers in leaf tobacco, 25.00. Retail dealers in leaf tobacco, 500.00.

And on sales of over \$1,000 fifty cents for every dollar in excess of \$1,000. Dealers in unmanufactured tobacco, 5.00. Manufacturers of stills, 50.00. And for each still manufactured, 20.00. And for each worm manufactured, 20.00. Manufacturers of cigars, 10.00. Peddlers of tobacco, first class (more than two horses), 60.00. Peddlers of tobacco, second class (two horses), 25.00. Peddlers of tobacco, third class (one horse), 15.00. Peddlers of tobacco, fourth class (on foot or public conveyance), 10.00.

Brewers of less than 50 barrels, 50.00. Brewers of 500 barrels or more, 100.00. Any person, so liable, who shall fail to comply with the foregoing requirements will be subject to severe penalties. Persons or Firms in Orangeburg County liable to pay any of the Special Taxes named above must apply to W. R. Cloutman, Esq., Collector of Internal Revenue at Charleston, or to P. V. Dibble, Deputy Collector at Orangeburg, S. C., and pay for and procure the Special Tax Stamp or Stamps they need, prior to May 1, 1874, and without further notice.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

WHEREAS, by a joint resolution of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, entitled "A joint resolution to require Edwin I. Cain, Sheriff of Orangeburg county, to give a new official bond within ten days after the passage of the same, otherwise the said office to be declared vacant, and it shall be the duty of the Governor to order an election to fill said vacancy," approved December 20th, 1873. And whereas, official information has been received at this department from the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners for the said county of Orangeburg, that the said County Commissioners have not received any new official bond, as required of said county since the passage of the said joint resolution. Now, therefore, you, and each of you, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the constitution and laws of the State touching your duty in such case, to cause an election to be held in the said county on the FIRST TUESDAY following the FIRST MONDAY in NOVEMBER NEXT, to fill said vacancy.

All bar rooms and drinking saloons shall be closed on the said day of election, and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drinks on said day of election shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined a sum of not less than One Hundred Dollars, or be imprisoned for a period of not less than one month nor more than six months.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed at Columbia, this 21st day of March, A. D. 1874, and in the eighty-eight year of American Independence.
