AN ATROCIOUS MURDER

Was committed near the banks of the South Edisto River in this county on the 2d of this month. It seems that a white man named Phillips had been living with a mulatto girl about 15 years of age, and being threatened with exposure, determined upon murder. This he accomplished by inducing his victim to follow him in the direction of Aiken county, under the promise that he would "fix her all right." Having got her near the river where his colored men had been stationed to assist him in his hellish design, he got out of his buggy, directing the girl to do likewise and shot her. She fell but was not killed. He then instructed his colored accomplices to finish his work. They shot her then until she was dead. During her death agonies she was delivered of the child begotten by this fiend, Phillips. These blood hounds having committed murder, set about then, as all incarnate devils do to secrete the evidence of their ghastly deed. The woman and child were tied together, and hung about with irons and thrown into the river. On the 4th of this month, however, they were discovered in a cove by two men who were out fishing. The body of the murdered girl was at once recognized, and the seducer and murderer suspected. Steps were taken by Trial Justice Phillips and others which led to the arrest of all three of the parties. The colored men confessed their guilt, and that they were to receive one hundred dollars a piece for taking a human life. May a speedy trial overtake them, and they be sent to join that through that rejoicing over wrong.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

WHEREAS, by a joint resolution of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, entitled "A joint resolution to require Edwin L. Cain, Sheriff of Orangeburg county, to give a new official bond within ten days after the passage of the same, otherwise the said office to be declared vacant, and it shall be the duty of the Governor to order an election to fill said vacancy." Approved December 20th, 1873. And whereas, official information has been received at this department from the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners for the said county of Orangeburg, that the said County Commissioners have not received any new official bond as sheriff of said county since the passage of the said joint resolution. Now, therefore, you, and each of you, are hereby required, with strict regard to the provisions of the constitution and laws of the State touching your duty in such case, to cause an election to be held in the said county on the FIRST TUESDAY following the FIRST MONDAY in NOVEMBER NEXT, to fill said vacancy.

All bar rooms and drinking saloons shall be closed on the said day of election, and any person who shall sell any intoxicating drinks on said day of election shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined a sum of not less than One Hundred Dollars, or be imprisoned for a period of not less than one month nor more than six months. In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed at Columbia, this 21st day of March, A.
