A High Toned Protest.

The Boston Journal thus discourseth on the above subject. That indignation meeting in Cooper Institute, which was so industriously advertised and loudly heralded, and which was to give voice to the protest of the people, 'irrespective of party,' against the Federal interference in Louisiana, resulted pretty much as might have been expected. Only two three reputable Republicans took part in it; a large number of old Democratic war horses were ranged on the platform, and as for the audience, it was made up chiefly of the 'great un washed, who surged through the hall and drove the reporters from their seats clambered into the organ loft, vented their humor in coarse jests, and yells, and laughter, and in appearance and bearing suggested a Tammany caucus. August Belmont's attempt to open the meeting was met with laughter and cries of 'Turn him out.' The venerable pet. Bryant was saluted with shouts of 'Turn him out,' 'Get out, Custom thief,' 'Tell him so speak up.' Although the crowd was sin-

er an jeers from the floor. If anything was needed to demonstrate the flimsy and artificial character of the Democratic uproar over this Louisiana matter, this so called indignation meeting would serve the purpose very well.

The troubles of Louisiana are of too serious nature to be seized upon by demagogues as a means of creating capital for a defunct party. The republicans who are drawn into any such schemes will find that they are being made the tools of designing men; who care less for the country than they do for the emolument of their party to power. While it is the duty of every Republican to protest against what is wrong in the Louisiana imbroglio, it is neither patriotic nor is it the part of wisdom to take action that will only contribute to the restoration of a party that can only hope for a new lease of life through the blunders of the Republicans.

A letter from Havana, dated the 5th inst., says the Spaniards in the interior towns are somewhat enthusiastic over the accession of Alfonso, but the better informed Spaniards in Havana believe that he will be compelled to abandon Spain before the end of the year. The number of troops in Cuba is barely sufficient to keep the insurgents from under taking any movement of magnitude in the Cinco Villas, while the Central Department belongs to the troops whether Spanish or insurgent, who happen to occupy any particular place.

The New York Times, speaking of the indignation meeting in that city, says it had been informed that on Sunday John Kelly made arrangements for at least two hundred and fifty men from each Assembly district to be sent to Cooper Institute, and from first to last the meeting had been "engineered" by the very Democrats who often figured in an unfavorable light before the public during the war.
