Darlington has been visited with a terrible conflagration. Some twenty-five buildings were destroyed, among them was the Court House. Supposed cause—incendiarism.

News Items.

Jacksonville, Fla., has been visited by a destructive fire. The cholera has made its appearance at Key West.

General Grant has issued an order directing all Department Commanders to withdraw their troops from all rented property and quarter them elsewhere.

Easter Sunday falls this year on the 1st of April. This circumstance has not occurred since 1853, and will only appear twice in the present century, in 1877 and 1888.

The Raleigh Progress says the peach and apricot trees were severely injured by the cold snap. Also, that a survey has been ordered to fix upon a point of location for a railroad bridge across the river at Wilmington.
