The Reconstruction Committee unanimously agreed to report a bill authorizing the President to order elections in Mississippi, Virginia and Texas, and to submit to spare votes the objectionable features in their proposed Constitution.

Mr. Sheldon, from Louisiana, was sworn in as Senator.

Gen. P. B. M. Young, representative from Georgia, informed a delegation from that State to-day that Butler's Georgia bill would probably not be resumed this session, and if taken up it would certainly be defeated.

The President has nominated Chas. H. Pettigill as Assessor for the First and C. H. Baldwin for the Second Revenue Collection Districts of South Carolina.

Amongst other appointments, which were confirmed by the Senate to-day, was that of Charles H. Pettigill as Assessor of Internal Revenue for the Third District of South Carolina.

The bill restoring the property of Blanton Bureau, of Kentucky, (some of which lies in Columbia,) was passed, and sent to the President.

The Senate adjourned, at 12 M, to-day, sine die.

The bill, for the further removal of political disabilities, failed utterly. The President has assigned the bill providing for elections in Virginia, Mississippi and Texas.
