

BLACKSBURG BUDGET.

The Weather—Work Resumed on the Phosphate Plant—Major Jones in Atlanta—Studying Medicine—Good Health has Prevailed.

BLACKSBURG, October 3.—A considerable change has come over the weather during the past 10 days in the matter of temperature, and we are having almost wintry mornings with delightful autumn days.

Work on the large phosphate plant, which has been suspended temporarily, was resumed Tuesday morning and will be pushed to completion.

Major John F. Jones, who has contributed so many fine specimens of minerals to the South Carolina exhibit at Atlanta from this section of the State, has been given charge of the entire exhibit of minerals of the State, and will spend much of his time during the exposition in Atlanta.

On Saturday, Mr. Sage Hardin left for Atlanta to attend medical lectures at the Southern Medical college, and Sunday evening, Mr. Sam Deal boarded the vestibule for Baltimore to become a student at the University Medical college in that city.

Mr. B. J. Gold is on a visit to friends and relatives in Cleveland county, N. C.

Our town and county has been quite healthy this summer and autumn, with the exception of two or three cases of typhoid fever, and a very mild form of influenza, the latter probably caused by inhalation of the dust, laden with decayed and pulverized vegetable matter.
