The county board adjourned without selecting a site for the courthouse. Since writing you I have conversed with a number of representative citizens from the county, and they are unanimous in the opinion that it should be located near the centre of the town as practicable.

The Gaffney Light infantry is making good progress in drilling, and there is no reason why it should not become the banner company of the state. The equipments have not arrived yet, although they are daily expected.
