

fact that even with that his troubles had only just commenced. There are numerous other cases against him, and, therefore, he will try to expiate the whole business by service on the road.

Trade has been better in Yorkville at this season of the year than it has been for some time. But that was when cotton was higher and everybody believed that it was bringing about what it was now. With prices as low as they are now, it is rather remarkable that any business is going on at all. It is not so bad as that, however. During the past week business has been fairly good. If other towns in the territory surrounding are getting along as well as Yorkville, there is no occasion just now for serious complaint.

The price of cotton in Yorkville yesterday ranged all the way from 5 cents to 9. More or less cotton was bought at every five or ten points between these figures, and possibly some went lower. The reporter saw one dirt-stained bale sell on Wednesday for 4.90. A good average of yesterday's sales were at about 5.37. The receipts in Yorkville on Thursday were considerably heavier than on any other day during the present season. They were comparatively large again on yesterday.

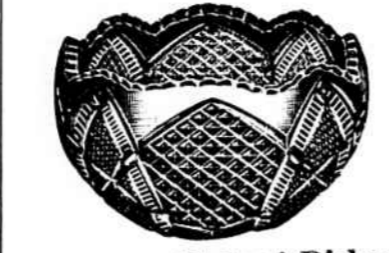
