TERMS OF PEACE.

Filipinos To Be Allowed a Liberal Form of Self-Government.

A Manila dispatch, published in the daily papers of yesterday, says that the United States Philippine commission has submitted to the Filipinos the

"While the final decision as to the form of government is in the hands of congress, the president, under his military power, pending the action of congress, stands ready to offer the follow ing form of government:

A governor general to be appointed by the president; a cabinet to be appointed by the governor general; all the judges to be appointed by the president; the heads of departments and judges to either be Americans or Filipinos, or both, and also a general advisory council, its members to be chosen by the people by a form of suffrage to be hereafter carefully determined upon

"The president earnestly desires that bloodshed cease and that the people of the Philippines, at an early date, enjoy the largest measure of self-government compatible with peace and

This scheme had been previously prefered and was not presented until after President McKinley had cabled his approval. The Filipinos bave not yet signified their acceptance of the proposition; but it is thought they will accept. Their army is now reduced to 11,000 men; 4,000 in one di vision and 7,000 in another. Their soldiers are poorly armed now and many of their rifles have become ineffective. The desire for peace is growing stronger and stronger every
