Sec. 2. That any person, or persons, who shall violate the provision of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction therefor, be subject to a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than five dollars, or be sentenced to work upon the public works of the towner upon the public works of the ic works of the town or upon the pub-ic works of the county, for a period of not less than three days nor more than fifteen days for each and every of-
