SMALLPOX WARNING.

To the People of Yorkville and York County:

SMALLPOX is epidemic on a large scale in the southeastern part of the county. The situation is so serious as to threaten a general spread of this most loathsome disease.

On Monday night, the 18th instant, a meeting of the members of the Yorkville town council, the Yorkville board of health, and the presidents of the local cotton mills, was held in the Yorkville town council chamber for the purpose of considering the situation in its relation to the comfort and safety of the people of the town and community.

After due consideration of the situation as it is now presented in the light of past experience, it was decided that although the town and community are gravely menaced, there is no recourse or reasonable hope of protection outside of general vaccination.

Pursuant to instructions from the conference, I hereby urge every individual white and black, male and female, to submit to vaccination forthwith, and by the same authority I also request that physicians of Yorkville and community give their valuable assistance in persuading the public of its danger and informing it of its only reasonable hope of immunity.

From the information developed, I am persuaded that the situation is very grave, and upon my own motion I beg to express the hope that the recommendation above outlined will be carried into effect without opposition and with the least possible delay.

IN accordance with law, my books will be open for the collection of the STATE, COUNTY AND SPECIAL TAXES for the fiscal year beginning January 1st, 1901, and ending December 31st, 1901, on the 15TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1901, and will be kept open until the 31st day of December, 1901.

I will also receive VOLUNTARY PAYMENTS for commutation road taxes for the year 1902.

And at Yorkville, Wednesday, the 11th, until Yorkville, the 31st day of December. After which day the books will be closed and the 15 per cent. penalty will be attached.
