Catawba Falls.
The promoters of the Great Catawba Falls power house have had a company of northern capitalists going over the grounds recently, and the report goes out that there is hope for early development of this property. It has been the idea of the promoters all along that there would some day be established a large manufacturing centre at the falls. But this idea is not being entertained any longer. Because of the unfortunate topography of the country, it is not considered practicable to build a railroad there, and, under the circumstances, it is thought best to merely develop electric power and distribute it to customers throughout the country. There is no way to get at a satisfactory estimate of the power that can probably be developed at Great Catawba Falls; but the opinions of various experts put the figures at from 30,000 to 100,000 horsepower.

—Davie, N. C., superior court convened last Monday, Judge Shaw presiding, and Solicitor Hammer prosecuting. In directing the attention of the grand jury to examine the condition of the county home, the judge said: "Mr. Foreman and gentlemen, when you visit the county home, whether by committee or in a body, I wish to join upon you not to take dinner with the keeper or superintendent, not that I think your opinions could be bought with a good dinner, but that after one has accepted the hospitality of another, it is natural that he afterwards entertains a different feeling." Continuing further he stated "that he had known superintendents of county homes to find out the exact day the grand jury was to visit the home and have a great dinner spread for them and after partaking would never fail to render a very favorable report."

—Charlotte Observer: Perhaps one secret of the ability of J. Pierpont Morgan to do things on a big scale is that he not only has the knack of getting hard work out of other men, but that he highly appreciates that work. An incident of his organization of the billion-dollar steel trust is related in this connection. The work to perfect this scheme entailed an enormous amount of extra labor upon Mr. Morgan's force of clerks in his New York office. It was nothing for them to work 14 hours a day during this period. When the plans were finally perfected Mr. Morgan made every clerk a present of a year's extra salary. Men do not mind doing hard work if it is appreciated and the great trust organizer of America evidently has the fullest appreciation of what his subordinates do toward achieving his ends.
