Barely Over 10,000,000 Bales. The last of the series of monthly ginner's reports issued by the department of agriculture was made public

at noon today, and as received by Gattis & Co. the crop ginned up to February 18, was 10,014,554 bales. This is considerably under expectations, and on the strength of such low figures May contracts went steadily up from 13.85 to very nearly 15 cents. The greater part of the rise was accomplished within a few minutes. All indications are that actual cotton is having but slight effect on the market prices being altogether a matter of manipulation. Some of the local experts say that there need be no occasion for surprise if contracts get to 20 cents or even higher within the next month or two. It is the first time within the recollection of anybody in this section when manipulators have had such complete control of the situation, and the laws of supply and demand entered to such a small extent in the matter of price.
