matches. It is expected that by 6 o'clock tomorrow morning by working all night, it will be ready for trains.

As soon as Mr. J. H. Hyatt, postmaster at Van Wyck, heard train 41 clear from the village and crash through the trestle, he went after Mr. J. H. Husley, section overseer of the Seaboard Air Line, and they went to the wreck. Both are emphatic in say-ing the crash was heard exactly at 1 o'clock.

with fifty men, and Trainmaster Gore
was sent for. When he arrived he

The mail car was heavily guarded, and some negroes were called on to take the mail over to the Southern railway to push it through.

Mr. Gore, with trembling hands, pulled away portions of a woman's body from the head of engine No. 654. The portion of the cloth taken away was blue, leading some to think that it was the dress of Mrs. Black, who was dressed in blue.

It is the opinion of railroad men that the derailing of both trains was the work of train wreckers, who hoped to gain thereby, as the following of the special was not known, and its coming blocked their plans.

About 1,500 people viewed the wreck, ten going from Yorkville and between 150 and 200 people from Rock Hill.

Coroner Louthian and Sheriff Logan went to the wreck on the 10 a.m. train with a party from Yorkville, and the inquest was in progress when the reporter returned.

"We will butcher them on the ranch and ship them to city We have already had in-from parties in Richmond, Baltimore, Philadelphia and other cities, but as yet we have made no shipments. By next spring we will have at least 200 young goats ready for market." Later Mr. Hunter and his associates may establish a cream milk.

### AN ORDINANCE

Relating to the Manufacture of Brick Etc., in the Town of Yorkville. an Ordinance prohibiting the making

An Ordinance prohibiting the making of excavations or digging of pits in the town of Yorkville, S. C., for the purpose of manufacturing bricks, pottery or other earthen products.

Be it ordained by the mayor and aldermen, the town council of Yorkville, S. C., in council assembled: Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to make any excavations or dig any pits in the town of Yorkville, S. C., for the manufacturing of bricks, pottery or other earthen products; Provided, that this ordinance shall not be vided, that this ordinance shall not be vided, that this ordinance shall not be construed to prevent the making of the said products from earth taken from hillsides in such manner that, without the aid of ditches, all water, surface and otherwise, will freely and naturally run off.

Sec. 2. That any person, persons

That any person, persons or corporation violating this ordinance shall, on conviction, be fined in a sum of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars for each day upon which this ordinance shall be violated or (as to persons) be imprisoned not less than ten days nor more than thirty days.

## HEALTH RULE.

The Board of Health of the Town of Yorkville, S. C., Enacts This Rule.


