Senator Bivens was occupying a seat in the section when he received the news. "Your wife has killed the Jew. Come at once." He immediately left for home, but was unable to give the newspapers any information.

AN INTERESTING RECORD.—Representative Lever, says a Washington dispatch, filed with the secretary of war, through the quartermaster general, the war claim of David R. Jamison of Darlington county, for reimbursement for baggage, equipment, etc., under the law allowing Confederate officers to claim damages for horses and baggage taken from them during the civil war. The claim of Jamison is very small, but he has an interesting personal record.

Mr. D. E. A. F. Jamison, president of Gen. Davis' F. Jamison, president of the 8th division of South Carolina, enlisted soon after the outbreak of the war and was commissioned as lieutenant of the 1st regiment of state troops. Gen. Micah Jenkins was his brother-in-law, having married his sister. He was on Gen. Jenkins' staff, with the rank of captain, and was with him until the Wilderness. Capt. Jamison was transferred to the staff of Gen. Jno. Bratton and remained with him until the surrender at Appomattox. He witnessed the surrender of Lee to Grant and was detailed to effect a surrender of ordnance and stores of the Confederate army to the Federal army. Gen. Ord was detailed to accept the surrender on the part of the Federal army. He is now 70 years old. After the surrender he rode from Appomattox to Yorkville, S. C., where his sister, the widow of Gen. Jenkins, resided. His baggage was taken at Orangeburg, his old home.
