Efird of Lexington un-dertook to make a prohibition speech and referred to conditions in Maine, telling how the prohibition laws were violated in "Boston." Somebody told him that Boston was not in Maine and he said he knew it was up that way somewhere.

PRINTERS STRIKE IN CHARLOTTE. All the union printers employed by the newspaper and job offices of Charlotte went on strike yesterday afternoon upon an hour's notice, upon the refusal of the employers to grant the demand for an eight hour work day. Half a dozen of-fices are affected, the most serious being The Observer, The Evening Chronicle, The Evening News and the Observer Printing House. The Observer and Chronicle will appear without interruption, a number of non-union men being employed to take the places of the strikers. The employing printers of Charlotte an-nounce that they will contest to the end the eight-hour movement and that no man who joined in the strike will be permitted to work in their offices. The strike will not affect seriously any office in Charlotte.


