

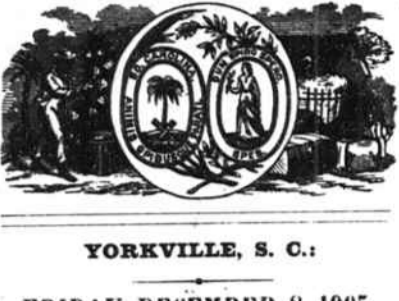

Senator Tillman on Wednesday introduced two resolutions which are intended to break down the barrier as to whether any of the national banks of the country have made campaign contributions in recent years.

The counties containing about half the white voters of South Carolina have declared opposition to the present dispensary system.

Thomas P. Wickes, a prominent attorney and former assistant corporation counsel for New York City, was yesterday indicted for grand larceny.

The supreme court on yesterday issued an order directing that J. S. Farnum, the recalcitrant Charleston dispenser, produce the papers that were demanded of him by the dispensary investigating committee.

Unanimous consent was given last Wednesday in the house for consideration of a bill appropriating \$14,000,000 for the Panama canal.

It is a matter of sincere regret to note that in his forthcoming report to the general assembly Superintendent of Education Martin will make another unfriendly comment on the progress of the work.

Washington, December 8: Representative John S. Dingley has introduced in the house a bill to amend the tariff act of 1902.

While the president's message indicates quite a come down on the railroad rate question, there is no occasion for especial surprise.

The twenty-four national banks of South Carolina, according to a Washington dispatch, make a good showing in the country under the last call of the comptroller of the currency.

The understanding is that the row which developed among members of the South Carolina delegation in Washington during the last session of congress over the Federal judgeship bill, involving one or more new places to hold court, will be renewed at this session.

Fall River, Mass., Dec. 5: The local cotton manufacturers express themselves as greatly dissatisfied with the government's system of issuing cotton reports and some of them are asking that action be taken by the manufacturers to bring about a change toward its abolishment.
