#### AN ORDINANCE. amending Sections 60, 61 and 62 of

Pin Alleys.

of Yorkville be and they are hereby amended by striking out said sections following to be known as Sections 60, 61, and 62 of Article X of the General Ordinances of the Town of Yorkville.

Sec. 60. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep for gain within the corporate limits of the Town any pool table or billiard table without first paying to the treasurer of said Town an annual license fee of One Hundred Dollars. Sec. 61 That said license fee shall be due and payable immediately upon the commencement of the keeping o said pool or billiard table and shall be good for one year from its date and shall be issued for no less a period than one year, and shall not be trans-

Sec. 62. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of the two foregoing sections shall be punished upon conviction therefor by a fine of not less than Five Dollars nor more than Twenty-Five Dollars or imprisonment with or without hard labor upon the public works of the Town or of York County for a period of not less than Two nor more than Thirty Days for each and every offense, and each day during which said Sections are violated shall be deemed and taken to be a separat
