The father's aim was bad and his shots went wild. Emerson, at the first shot, pulled his pistol and fired, killing Drake instantly. Emerson then surrendered. Drake was fifty years old and one of the most prominent planters of that section. He leaves a family. Emerson is forty and a widower. An inquest was held this afternoon and the responsibility for Drake's death placed at Emerson's door. Emerson, who was a distant cousin of Drake's held a minor county office. The daughter of Drake is said to have left for parts unknown.


