Homicide In Gastonia.—Lee J. Cudd, aged twenty-five, was shot and killed at the Avon mill this afternoon by his father-in-law, Jos. B. McGathey. It seems that there had been bad blood between Cudd and McGathey for some time, on account of the relations existing between Cudd and his wife before ing between Cudd and his wife before their marriage. Cudd and Addie Matilda McGathey were married three weeks ago by Rev. J. A. Hoyle, but for several years prior to this time the two had lived together as man and wife. Cudd and Tom Pressley, who lived in the same house with him, received a shipment of Christmas booze this morning, and were preparing for a good time. Both Cudd and Pressley ad been to McGathey's house, and given him a drink or two, and had returned home and gone to bed, when McGathey came and inquired for Cudd. When told that Cudd was in bed he went to Cudd's room and pulled him out of bed, and the two went down stairs together, and after some words McGathey went home and returned with a shot gun. Cudd met him at the door and both fired. Cudd using a revolver. The shot from the gun took effect in Cudd's right breast, causing

instant death. instant death.

McGathey returned to his home, where, a few minutes later, he was taken in custody by Policeman Wiley Carroll and lodged in the city jail. A preliminary hearing will be given McGathey tomorrow.—Gastonia special of Wednesday to Charlotte Observer.

GAIN IN POSTAL RECEIPTS.—A reduc-tion of more than \$4,000,000, or 27.83 per cent in the excess of expenditures over receipts of the postoffice department is shown in the annual report of Edwin C. Madden, third assistant postmaster general, which was made pub-lic yesterday. The total postal reve-nue for the fiscal year of 1906 shows an increase of more than \$15,000,000 over that of 1906, the greatest increase over that of 1906, the greatest increase in one year in the history of the postal service. The total receipts from all sources were \$167,932,782; and the total expenditures \$178,449,778. The gross deficit including losses by burglary and fire and through uncollected debts amounted to \$10,542,941.

An enormous increase in the demand for story supplies—pearly \$00,000.

for stamp supplies—nearly 800,000,000,000 stamps, amounting to a gain of more than 10 per cent over the previous year—"is a striking indication of the wonderful growth of postal business due to the country's great pros-perity."

Considerable space is devoted in the

report to a consideration of second-class mail matter. After discussing the work of the congressional commission appointed to consider the question of second-class matter and remove all present restrictions, he urges that what is needed is an "up-to-date, workable law—a law which can be enforced; a law the terms and limita-tions of which will be plain to pub-lishers, to postmasters and to the de-

partment."

Mr. Madden says he is "convinced that an increase in the rate of postage would ultimately prove beneficial to all and would not work disastrously


