Mr. McDonald did not question the right of the governor to remove the directors; but argued that inasmuch as the statutes did not prescribe a method, there was nothing left but to fall back on the common law practice and give the accused the right to show cause. Mr. Lyon agreed with Mr. McDonald, and there was no dispute. During the course of his argument before the governor, Mr. McDonald took occasion to say that he had always been opposed to the dispensary method of handling whisky and that he sincerely hoped it would be abolished. In that event, of course, there would be need for no further proceedings in this case. Attorney General Lyon prepared the bill of complaint against the direc-tors. It sets forth in detail the various charges that were preferred by the legislative investigating committee. It is quite probable that the hearing will assume the dimensions of a tria and will last for several days.
