Rutland, at Batesburg. In support of this contention they asserted that, although the assault was alleged to have been committed on the 7th of February, the warrant was not issued until the 29th of May, more than three months afterwards. The woman gave as her reason for not having the warrant issued earlier, that she was advised by her attorney to withhold the warrant. The next witness was Ralph H. Clarke, son of the woman in the case. He corroborated the statement of his mother. There were two other witnesses for the state. The defendant denied every allegation of the prosecution. He testified that he had never touched the woman in his life. He was attending services at the Baptist church on Sunday evening, February 7th, at the time the alleged assault is said to have been committed. T. Hundley and the Rev. S. O.
