A Little Less Grumbling and a Little More Work the Remedy. Editor Yorkville Enquirer.

It is never too late to say or de something for the cause of good roads. In fact now is the time, for the good roads' fever is just beginning to spread, and for fear it may not catch in every section and in every corner, this article is written.

In my opinion, York county will not have good roads during the present have good roads during the present generation so long as people depend solely on our tax money and chain-gang to make them for us. It is true, in one sense that to build and maintain good roads costs lots of money-a great deal more in some sections than in others, because of natural disadvantages, such as steep red clay hills, rough, rocky places and difficulty in draining roads in a proper way. It is not a hard problem to keep up and maintain a good road, for it only means a little work. This writer saw several places last

winter along different roads, where, be-

cause of mudholes, the traveling public would drive off to one edge, barely placing the wheels of their vehicle in the adjoining farm land, and because this, the farmer in question had driven down stakes to compel these buggies and wagons to go through the anything like this, I say shame on you! Instead of driving stakes, keep away points. from town most every day through the spinning yarns and cussing bad roads. away from the yarn spinning, joke tellfill them up good, pull up your stakes, resolve to never drive another one, and induce some one else to do likewise. There are lots of people that will call this doing something for nothing. Not a bit of it! You will reap the advanend your teams or drive one yourself a day or two on your public road hauling sand to places where it is needed and while your road is being worked by the township money, be on hands again with your team and self, make what money you can after crops are aid-by and if the tax money gives out before your road is fixed up right, offer your team for a day or two, until the road is in better shape than ever before. Don't be so stingy, don't be so miserly, help to make good roads. Make a split log-drag—use it at every opportunity after a rain and see what say: "I have got so many other things to see after and never have time to fool away on roads." Brother farmer.
