

Cold Weather At Last .- The cold wave, says a Washington dispatch of yesterday, has tightened its grasps on the country from the Rocky Mountains eastward to New England and south-ward as far as northern Texas and across the gulf states to northern Florida. Temperature below freezing is reported from most of this territory.

Weather bureau officials said no warmer weather is in sight for a couple of days, at least. The first zero weather of autumn is

reported from Huron, S. D. From this extreme cold, temperatures range to 4 above at Moorehead, Minn., 16 at Val-entine, Neb., 10 at Sioux City, Ia., and 16 at St. Paul. Northern Texas expe-rienced the coldest weather for the season. At Amarillo it was 16, and at Abiline 32. Extending eastward temperatures were: Oklahoma City, 26; Fort Smith and Little Rock, 28; Mem-phis, 30; Nashville, 28; Asheville, N. C., 30. In the lake region and east-ward cold weather is accompanied by


