Taylor, secretary of the State Cotton ed Crushers' association, at which definite agreement was reached as to all of the details incident to the putting into effect of the system of grading cotton seed to be conducted by the de-partment of agriculture during this

vear. missioner Watson stated last Commissioner Watson stated last night that the necessary equipment had been provided at the state labora-tory and the extra man who will do this work under the direction of the chief chemist had been selected.
