

AROUND BOWLING GREEN

Crowders' Creek Farmers Being Benefitted by Drainage Experiment—Plenty of Clover and More Fine Hogs. continues The Yorkville Enquirer.

Bowling Green, December 29.—Farmers who live along Crowders' creek are very much pleased with the crops of corn that they made this year, at least in the vicinity of Bowling Green and up and down the creek for several miles. Up the creek in North Carolina, from the point where the dredging began and on down, this year's crop is the second one since a considerable portion of the dredging was done, and the dredged bottoms have already begun to give back a portion of the cost of the dredging. The creek did not overflow the bottoms and as the second year's cultivation began to get under way the increased yield was very much in evidence. The work of dredging was discontinued a short distance above the York county line on account of rock in the creek bed that could not be removed except at a very heavy expense for labor. The natural current of the creek was strong and the banks reasonably high, and the farmers living below the dam at the point where the dredging was discontinued are not looking for much trouble on account of overflows for John E.
