which good middling cotton of the present crop has sold in this section, was about six and three-quarter cents. The highest price paid yesterday was, therefore, about three and a quarter cents per pound over the low level to which the price sagged last fall. In dollars and cents it means a differ-ence of \$16.25 per bale, making the estimate on the basis of 500 pounds to the bale. A leading cotton merchant of Greenville told the News yesterday that his firm was willing to pay 10 cents a pound for good middling cotcents a pound for good middling cot-ton. Of course, it might be worth more or less by tomorrow. People who have held cotton for 10 cents a pound now have found their opportunity, provided there is no break in the market tomorrow. Of course, this price is being offered only for the best grade of the staple. It is estimated by those in position to know that of the 49,000 bales of cotton which the government reports as having been ginned in Greenville county this year, about 30 per cent, 15,000 bales in round numbers, is still being held by the growers. 
