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



The Road to King's Mountain. Following is an extract from an ar-ticle in the current issue of the King's Mountain Herald: The Cleveland county commissioners are certainly making good their pledge to build the King's Mountain-Yorkville road in consideration of the county line election held in April being favorable to Cleve-land county, and as soon as they are done with the Yorkville end of the road, the other end of the road extend-ing from King's Mountain to the line of Number Five township, will be built. The King's Mountain precinct road force is doing the work under the direction of J. R. Gambel, who is recog-nized as an expert road builder. This means that the work will be done right. When this road is completed a gateway will be opened to South Carolina com-merce and travel, a lack of which the town of King's Mountain has felt keentown of King's Mountain has felt keen-ly for forty years. It will open up a large area of good farming country just across the mountain and make it easily accessible to our town. That trade logically belongs here, but the extreme difficulty heretofore encounter-ed in crossing the mountain has turned in crossing the mountain has turned the business to Gastona, Clover and Yorkville. We understand that the people over there are already rejoicing that they are to have a great wall broken down and that they are to make our acquaintance more fully. King's Mountain holds out a glad hand of welcome to these people and pledge helrself to do them good. The pros pect now is that the mountain road will be open for travel by spring, possibly earlier.


