Likely to Happen With Children. When gum is on clothing hold a piece of ice on the opposite side of the goods and the gum will be removed easily.

The Wrong Side of Wall Paper. If you have several pairs of rolls of light wall paper, just try taking them wrong side out. They make a very pretty tan room.

A New Use for a Flowerpot Saucer. An inverted earthen, flowerpot saucer makes an ideal stand for the iron, prevents scorching of the iron-board cover and avoids the nerve-racking clank-clank of the usual metal stand.

Don't Throw Cereal Boxes Away. Save your cereal cartons in which to store quart and pint cans of fruit, berries, cherries, tomatoes, etc., that bleach when exposed to light. The boxes keep the cans from dust and help to preserve the contents.

Getting Ahead of the Wind. To a convenient place outside of the front door attach a spring clothespin and ask the paper boy to snap your paper in it. By this simple device your paper avoids a journey down the street and is kept clean.

Saving Space in the Refrigerator. Left-over food is often wasted by evaporation if small quantities are stored away in large dishes and bowls in the ice box. The cooking teacher at a course of demonstration lectures advocated putting left-overs in preserve or jelly glasses, both for this reason and because more space is left in the ice box.

Fruit Shines for Shoes. A most satisfactory way to dress shoes is to rub them with a section of an orange or a lemon, and then to polish with a dry cloth. It gives a brilliant luster to shoes not badly worn, and does not soil the clothing. It is often a convenience in freshening up shoes at the end of a journey, for a fruit luncheon is easily obtained and practically applied.

A Good Pad for Hot Kettles. An old catalogue or a magazine on the shelf of the range or on the kitchen table makes a good pad on which to set kettles. By tearing off the top page when soiled, the pad is kept always clean.

A Way to Clean White Shoes. If the buckskin uppers of your shoes are soiled you can clean them neatly and cheaply with sandpaper. Buy a sheet of the finest grade, costing a few cents, and cut off a little strip. With this rub the leather gently until all dirt disappears. One sheet of paper will last for a number of cleanings.

Miles Standish, Jr., Weds. Miles Standish, Jr., of Boston, a direct descendant of Capt. Miles Standish, married Miss Hester Trumbull at Litchfield, Connecticut, recently. Miss Trumbull traces her descent from Priscilla Mullens and John Alden. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. William Brewster of the Methodist church.

Onion and Pepper Relish. Red bell peppers 1 cup sugar 6 green bell peppers 2 tablespoons salt 6 onions 1 cup vinegar. Remove stem and seeds from peppers and skin from onions. Cut vegetables through meat chopper, using a coarse knife, put in saucpan, cover with boiling water and let stand five minutes. Drain, discarding water, return to saucpan, add sugar, salt and vinegar, stir thoroughly, bring to boiling point, and let boil twenty minutes. Put in sterilized jars, adjust rubbers and covers or corks, seal and label.

Chili Sauce. 12 ripe tomatoes, 2 large onions, 4 sweet green peppers, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups vinegar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon clove, 1 teaspoon nutmeg. Scald and peel tomatoes. Peel onions, and remove stems and seeds from green peppers. Put onions and peppers through food chopper, add tomatoes, sugar, vinegar and spices. Bring to boiling point, stir frequently and cook until the mixture thickens. Put in sterilized bottles or jars, adjust rubbers and covers or corks, seal and label.

Piccilli. 1 peck green tomatoes, 6 medium sized onions, 1 cup salt, 2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon cloves, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, one red pepper, wipe tomatoes and peel onions. Put through food chopper, using coarse knife. Sprinkle with salt and let stand overnight. Drain in a bag, put chopper mixture into a preserving kettle, add red pepper put through food chopper, using coarse knife, cover with vinegar, and add sugar mixed with clove and cinnamon. Mix thoroughly, and cook gently until thick, stirring occasionally. Put in sterilized glass jars or bottles, adjust

rubbers and covers, seal, label, and store until required.

Does it Sound Possible? The woman who cooks will gasp at the figures of one of the largest of our camp kitchens in France. Here is how the mess sergeant puts it: "The kitchen range was 928 feet wide and 1,265 feet long. Eighteen firemen kept it hot; there were 519 cooks and 700 K. P.'s (Kitchen Police). We mashed potatoes with a pile driver; coffee we ground with a 350-horse, high-power motor. Dirty pans were hauled out in railroad cars. As mess sergeant I rode up and down the kitchen on a motorcycle shouting orders through a megaphone. When we had flapjacks, we mixed the batter in 12 concrete mixers, had a steam shovel moving egg shells away from the door and six K. P.'s with bacon rinds strapped on their feet skating over the griddle to keep it greased."

Chinese Women Rarely Remarry. As a rule customs of society do not go further; but in some parts of Fuhien the self-destruction of widows in the devotion to their husbands has assumed almost barbarous forms. For example, when a man passes away his wife will generally declare her intention to kill herself to demonstrate her faithfulness toward him. Then the elders of the family will cause a high stage to be erected and invite their relatives, friends and acquaintances to witness the heroic deed. When the appointed hour has come and the spectators have assembled, the lady will ascend the steps to hang herself amid the admiration and approbation of the spectators. Then a stone arch will be erected to her memory, and the family will be regarded as illustrious for possessing such a devoted wife.

What Women Are Doing. There are 12,000,000 wage earning women in the United States. In India only 12 women in every 1,000 of full age can read and write. Texas was the ninth state to ratify the federal constitution amendment granting suffrage to women. Of the 4000 members of the teaching staff at Columbia university this summer, 110 were women.

Mayor Hyman of New York city, will employ a woman lawyer to defend women in the women's court. Although the late Amelia E. Barr, was the author of more than 75 novels, she left an estate valued at only \$550. The Women's Trade Union league with over 500,000 members has pledged its support to the American Labor party.

Four women are members of the first class to be graduated from the law department of the University of Detroit. Katherine P. Edison of the industrial welfare commission, says that the cost of living for women has increased 41 per cent, since 1914.

At the request of the French government, United States women expert cannery have gone to that country to teach their methods. The divorce rate in Canada is about one divorce for every 100,000 of population, while in the United States it is 112 per 100,000 of population.

Whether E. J. Sherwood or P. H. Spill, received a majority of the votes cast in the recent Democratic primary in the Sixth district to elect a successor to the late Congressman J. Willard Ragsdale, has not yet been decided by the State Democratic executive committee, due to the fact that the executive committee of Dillon county has not yet reported the vote from that county to the state committee.
