The greatest sorrow bearing none who ever sat in the halls of the United States senate, said Dr. Lodge, was John C. Calhoun of South Carolina.

On questions of constitutional law and questions of ethics this old man of 70 stood impregnable. He had many other southern men. Yet how many students in our high schools and colleges know of our great men?

People sometimes rather lament that they are so unfortunate as to be children of the south. God forbid that any child of South Carolina should turn his or her back upon the glorious past of their state.

A real memorial, said the speaker, is the living consciousness of the people. We men whose hearts ought to be fired by your activities do not take the interest that we should in the memories of our southern heroes.

Appealing to his audience never to refer to the War Between the States as the "Lost Cause," the speaker said that the principles for which the Confederacy fought were the same for which the Revolutionary war was fought.

"Let no southern man or woman ever say 'Lost Cause,'" he said. It was not lost, because it is a righteous cause and no righteous cause was ever lost in the sight of God.

There are South Carolina names that rank well with those of any other section of the country in connection with the War of the Revolution and other wars that are equally as prominent and great as the names in the nation's history in any other section.

The speaker reviewed the military career of the noted Confederate general and declared that there was a strong parallel between General Hill and General Jackson, both being men of the strongest character with an abiding faith in God.

His hold of the Confederate commander's appointment to West Point in 1842 of his twice being breveted in the Mexican war, being one of six in the entire army who were breveted in that war.

SOUTH CAROLINA MEMORIAL COMMISSION. Sections 3 and 4 from Joint Resolutions of the S. C. General Assembly.

Section 3. Memorial Buildings.—That when said Commission shall have subject to their orders as above provided, such sums as they may deem sufficient, they shall erect a suitable memorial building of architectural beauty and appropriateness at the Capital building of the State upon grounds now owned by the State and held by the Board of Trustees of the University of South Carolina, said memorial building to be designed as a memorial chapel building.

Section 4. Inscriptions.—Historical Collections.—That said memorial building shall preserve in marble or bronze or other imperishable form the names of all South Carolinians, whether soldiers, sailors, nurses or other workers in the cause of victory, who have offered their lives as the supreme sacrifice in the winning of the war; and said building shall be the repository of books, manuscripts and other records of the history of the war and its purposes and achievements, and of the part borne in said war by the State of South Carolina, and by her sons and daughters, whether in organizations or as individuals, and whether in battle or in other work and service; especially shall there be preserved in said memorial building writings commemorative of the military and naval exploits and brave and patriotic deeds of South Carolinians who have shared the dangers and glories of the great war on land and sea and in the air; and said building shall contain alcoves or sections for separate memorials to the men and women of the several counties of the State.
