

HOLD THEM TIGHT

Wannamaker Advises Cotton Producers Not to Sell.

Discussing the break in the cotton market Wednesday, J. Skottowe Wannamaker, president of the American Cotton association declared, in a statement Wednesday that a raid on the cotton market was engineered by manipulators who realized the desperate predicament that they were in with an enormous amount of cotton sold throughout the exchanges, delivery date fast approaching and no possibility of their being able to fill these contracts with spot cotton, which is certain to be demanded.

Members of the American Cotton association are urged in the statement not to sell their cotton. "We find," says Mr. Wannamaker, "that an enormous amount of spot cotton has been purchased through the New York and New Orleans exchanges for December and January alone. All of this cotton will be demanded by the buyers on account of cotton but especially of good grade the enormous shortage, not only of cotton.

"In desperation the manipulators have used every known means to extricate themselves from their predicament. They attempted every pressure possible to bear to have a ruling put through limiting or prohibiting speculation. They sold something they did not own, and now cannot secure, and wish as is customary, to shoulder the losses upon the producer. Why not ask that a ruling be issued prohibiting the sale of something you do not own? On every occasion for the last 60 years when cotton has been carried to something like fair valuation, manipulation has been used for the purpose of depressing the price. Men have been called into court and prosecuted for beating the price down.

"This is simply an attempt to force the producer to part with his cotton so as to enable the manipulator to secure spot cotton with which to fill his contract and save his hide. Do not sell your spot cotton. Let them drive paper cotton down as low as they like with a world demand far in excess of the possible supply of raw cotton. With the manufactured product selling at a fabulous profit, with a demand for manufactured goods which is impossible to fill, high prices are absolutely certain.

"A careful canvass of the entire cotton belt, reveals the startling fact that there are not 2,000,000 bales of good grade cotton in sight in the cot-

ton belt today, and there are only 22,000 bales of certified cotton on the New York exchange with sales on the exchanges for December and January around a million bales. With the largest amount of cotton already purchased through the New York and New Orleans exchanges by the actual consumers of raw cotton, we are facing the absolute certainty of the manipulators being placed in a predicament. The only possibility of relief is to force the producer to part with his cotton. To sell cotton under these conditions is worse than folly. The fact that the manufactured product is bringing a profit of from \$100 to \$350 per bale basis middling to the manufacturer. That we have the shortest crop in a decade, the shortest supply of good grade cotton in proportion to the crop ever produced in the last 60 years, the unheard of pericament of the bear speculators on the exchanges, and the startling fact that a canvass of the entire cotton belt shows that there are not 2,000,000 bales of good grade cotton in sight today, all bring to light the absolute certainty of much higher prices.

"I call on the members of the American Cotton association to protect themselves by absolutely refusing to sell a bale of cotton during this absolutely unjustifiable manipulated pre-arranged drive which is put in force for the purpose of beating down prices. This will not only stabilize the market, but will force prices back up. The absolute certainty of far higher prices, we find, are assured as a result of a careful investigation throughout the cotton industrial world."

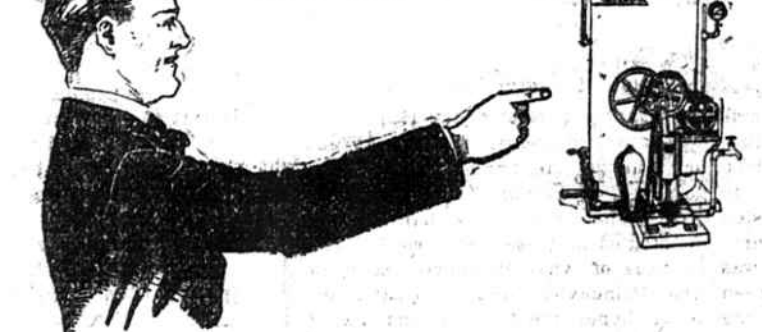

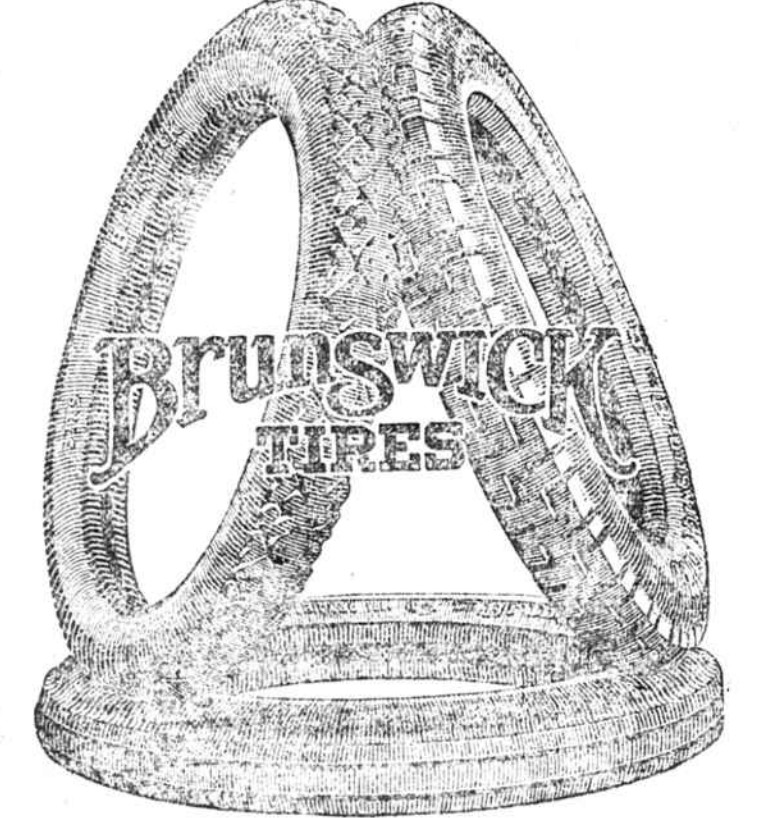
