STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Items of Interest Gathered From All Sections of South Carolina.

—A case of small pox has been reported in Columbia.

—The annual meeting of the South Carolina College Press Association was held in Columbia, last week.

—R. Ben Fulton has been appointed United States commissioner at Florence to succeed R. J. Kirk, resigned, Friday.

—The County Savings Bank is the name of a new banking institution for Abbeville, which will open its doors for business within the next few days.

—Columbia's population in July of 1919 was 43,865 which is an increase of 66.7-10 per cent. in the last ten years, according to the Newspaper Feature bureau of Columbia, which has just announced its figures for that city.

—General headquarters of the Baptist denomination in South Carolina will be located at 1301 Hampton street, Columbia, the general board of the state convention having purchased the property last Thursday.

—Conway, December 5: Conway was considerably disturbed this morning when S. H. Jeter, who claimed to be from Edgefield and a typewriter repairer, made a number of uncomplimentary remarks with reference to the local fuel restrictions in several business houses yesterday afternoon. The principal merchants and business men of the town in a meeting agreed to open at 9 a. m. and close at 4 p. m. in compliance with instructions of the central fuel committee. —The jury in the case of H. J. Hagan, president of the Scandinavian-American Bank of Fargo, N. D., charged with having made false statements to the bank examiner on Thursday returned a verdict of guilty.

—George Carpentier, French heavyweight champion prize fighter knocked out Joe Beckett, champion of England in the first round of a fight staged in London Thursday night for the championship of Europe.

—Charging them with violating the Lever Act as amended October 22 last, United States District Attorney Lee Douglas on Friday swore out warrants against fifteen meat dealers doing business in the city market house in Nashville, Tenn.

—The historical French opera house at Bourbon and Toulouse streets in New Orleans, the scene of the debut in the United States of Adelina Patti and whose audiences have heard the voices of Jenne Reske and Jenny Lind, burned to the ground last Thursday.

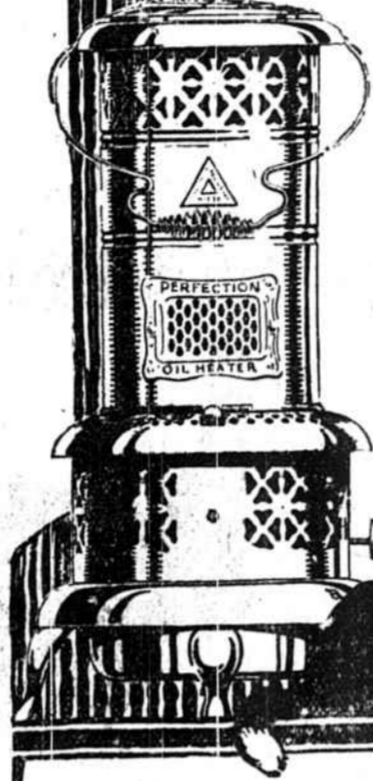
