

A case of a man's heart ceasing to beat for 14 hours and then resuming work is reported from Bern, Switzerland, where a pastor of that city, Reverend Mr. Baudebacher, after being officially declared dead suddenly awoke. The Reverend Mr. Baudebacher, aged 50 and suffering from heart trouble of long standing fell senseless Friday. His physician issued a death certificate, arrangements were made for the funeral and Saturday's newspapers published eulogies of him. The pastor awoke after 14 hours, surprised to find his bedroom filled with flowers, wreaths, disconsolate relations and friends. He said weekly: "My fall has not yet come." The funeral was held post-noon and was officiated by the Rev. Mr. Baudebacher himself. He said that the Rev. Mr. Baudebacher might live many years.

Almost we can imagine her surprise when she found that for her 'school was out,' and answered 'Adsum' not in her accustomed place but face to face with the Great Teacher in that School."

AN ORDINANCE Regulating the Rate of Speed and Method by Which Trains on the C. & N.-W. Railroad Shall Approach the Station, and Regulating the Manner in Which Shifting and Movement of Cars Shall be Done.

BE it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen, constituting the Town Council of the Town of York: Section 1: That from and after the passage of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the C. & N.-W. Railroad Company to approach all North bound trains, arriving at York between eight and nine o'clock A. M., to bring the said trains to a full stop when the engine thereof shall have approached within twenty feet of East Liberty Street. The said trains shall then proceed across Liberty Street only with the train under full control, and at a rate of speed not exceeding four miles per hour.

Section 2: That when any freight train is shifting at said crossing, it shall be the duty of the C. & N.-W. Railroad Company to station a watchman or flagman to be stationed at Liberty Street Crossing, to warn all traffic of the approach of passage of such cars or trains, and said flagman or watchman shall remain on duty during the entire time the said train is shifting.

Section 3: It shall be the duty at all times of the C. & N.-W. Railroad Company, in addition to the requirements herein provided for, to approach said Liberty Street Crossing with all trains under full control and at a rate of speed not exceeding four miles per hour.

Section 4: For each and any violation of the provisions of this Ordinance by any agent or official of the said Railroad Company, such officer, agent or servant, shall be subject to a fine of not less than Twenty-Five, nor more than One Hundred Dollars, or imprisonment for a period of not less than five days, nor more than thirty days, at the discretion of the trial officer.

TAX EXTENSION Office of the County Treasurer of York County, York S. C., March 1, 1921.

PURSUANT to Act of the General Assembly notice is hereby given that the time for the payment of taxes due between October 15 and December 31, 1920, has been extended to May 1, 1921, with a three per cent penalty added to all payments, made after March 1. From May 1 to May 15, 1921 there will be a penalty of 7 per cent, and after May 15 unpaid taxes will go into execution. Unpaid poll taxes will be placed on the hands of the magistrates of the several townships for prosecution.

All of the Banks of the county are offering their accommodations and facilities to Taxpayers who may desire to make use of the same, and I am taking pleasure in giving prompt attention to all correspondence on the subject.
