

TEACHERS EXAMINATION

LOCAL LACONICS

Off to Fort Mill. The American Legion baseball team of Yorkville left shortly after noon today for Fort Mill, where this afternoon they will play the Fort Mill baseball team.

Yorkville Negroes Lose. The colored baseball team of Yorkville lost to Rock Hill in Rock Hill yesterday afternoon by a score of 13 to 7.

Tax Collections. Tax collections up to date aggregate \$593,847.28, with additions amounting to approximately \$617,000. The 7 per cent. penalty attaches to taxes paid between now and next Saturday evening, after which date delinquents will go into execution.

Fire Insurance Premiums. Insurance Commissioner McMahon has sent out to the towns entitled to the same a rebate of 1 per cent on the premium paid to fire insurance companies in South Carolina. York county towns get rebates as follows: Yorkville, \$346.67; Fort Mill, \$139.20; Rock Hill, \$1,045.86.

Violated Labor Law. Columbia State Sunday: Another prosecution for a violation of the labor laws of South Carolina was made at

Rock Hill last week by the labor inspectors of the state department of agriculture, commerce and industries. An employe of the Hamilton Carhart cotton mills complained to Governor Cooper that this mill was working its employes overtime and the complaint was referred to Commissioner Harris, who had his labor inspectors make an investigation. The superintendent of the mill pleaded guilty in a magistrate's court and was fined \$25. Section 421 of Volume 11, criminal code of South Carolina laws prohibits employes of textile plants from working more than 60 hours per week and more than 11 hours in any one day, except for the purpose of making up lost time caused by accident or an unavoidable cause in which case a notice must be posted in each room stating the exact starting and stopping time for all employes.

Paid Fine for Gambling.

J. N. Gates, a traveling man of Blacksburg, representative of a wholesale grocery firm of that town paid a fine of \$10 in Magistrate Fred Black's court Saturday following his plea of guilty to a charge of gambling. According to the magistrate, the case against Gates arose as the result of an effort made to require him to pay a check issued by him in the sum of \$78. It is alleged that he sat in a game with a number of Yorkville gamblers some weeks ago and lost. He gave one of the gamblers a check for \$78 and this was turned down by the bank on which it was drawn. Gates was notified but refused to pay. The man to whom the check was given turned it over to the magistrate for collection. It developed that Gates could not be made to pay the check but pleaded guilty to gambling. "He was present Saturday and was also represented by N. W. Hardin, a Blacksburg attorney. According to report, local poker players with whom Gates is alleged to have "set in" on a number of occasions, says that he is from henceforth and forever more barred.

Columbia May 7: Acting in consonance with a resolution passed at a meeting of the board of trustees of the University of South Carolina, March 31, this year the disciplinary committee suspended 48 undergraduates of the institution who confessed as being or having been during the college term, connected with sub-rosa "Greek letter" fraternities of this number 17 years seniors. The suspension is for one week. The state prohibits the existence of such fraternities in institutions of higher learning supported by taxation.
